The College recently hosted our Strategic Planning Day for 2025.

We had attendees from all areas of the education Department - Dale Watkins the Coordinator of Regional Operations, Amanda Morton Regional Services Support Coordinator; Janet Silburn-Barker ESHS Principal, Sam Miller Student Services ESHS and Luke Brown College Psychologist. Kris Starcevich also joined us from Goldfields/ Esperance Development Commission as well as our full team of supervisory staff, ancillary staff, administration staff as well as representatives of the student body, Kasey Gordon (Head Girl 2025) and Madison Kalalo.

Planning for the future of the College included the topics of College Presentation, College/School Partnership, Parent Involvement, Student Development and Education and ended with Staffing.

After compiling feedback from everyone on what, in their opinions, were College success stories, we brainstormed together for a further couple of hours, trying to think of ways we could improve the already high standards we have here at the College. In groups consisting of people from different areas within the College and the wider community, we put together suggestions and then had an informal 'vote' on each one, with the most popular listed below:

College Presentation

- A Relaxation Garden for the students to enjoy. The students can contribute to it, which will enhance their sense of belonging and emotional connection to the College. We look to include things like a water feature/wishing well, an "emotion" tree that they can talk to or stick notes to or even decorate a section of the fence with friendship locks or bracelets.
- Giving students more responsibility for presentation of the College.
- A dedicated art room for the students.

College/School Partnership

- More communication from the school in regards to camps and excursions and more options on how to track where students are at academically.
- Open days at ERC that encompass tours of ESHS.

Parent Involvement

- Encourage parent responsibility and involvement with more frequent contact from College staff in regards to how their student is travelling and any extra assistance they may require.
- Produce a "Day in the life of a student" blog/vlog to showcase how the College runs day-to-day for the students.

Student Development and Education

- Teaching basic life skills organisation skills, hygiene, simple cooking.
- More complex life skills workshops tax file number applications, financial planning and advice, how to fill job applications.

Staffing

- Consistency between staff members fair behaviour expectations, reward structures etc.
- Showing more appreciation for the everyday things that all of the staff do behind the scenes.

As you can see, a wide range of topics were discussed and decided upon. At the end of the process, we have a clear view of what is needed/desired at the College and a detailed approach on how we can achieve it.

The workshop was a successful venture in bringing together all of the interested parties to the College and clarifying the decisions and changes we need to put in place moving forward to keep the College at the peak of its ability to provide an excellent residential facility for students from all walks of life.
