MUSIC IN THE SCHOOL CURRICULUM

Music is:

- A discipline of The Arts Learning Area.
- Part of the curriculum in public primary schools.
- Available to lower secondary and senior school students in public high schools.





PARTICIPATION IN MUSIC

Development in:

- Specific musical skills.
- General cognitive, social and emotional skills.
- Performance opportunities in the local and wider community.
- Appreciating music as a listener.
- Self esteem and self confidence.

- It is an enrichment/extension for students who demonstrate special aptitude through a testing and selection process that includes physical suitability.
- The program requires commitment and special effort over an extended period of time.
- Places are limited and eagerly sought.
- Continuity into high school is important (where available) the benefits will grow over the years. Please contact your local high school to check on the instruments they offer.

ABOUT INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC

(3/3)

- Approximately 400 primary and 85 secondary schools offer instrumental music across the state.
- There are approximately 20,000 students from Year 3 to Year 12 in the IMSS program.
- Many who started in the IMSS program have worked professionally in music.
- Many students continue to enjoy their musical experience through a range of music activities.





HOW DOES THE PROGRAM WORK?

(1/3)

- It is planned as an area/cluster scheme.
- It builds on the class music program.
- It is a partnership between:
 - the school
 - the parents
 - the students
 - the IMSS teachers





HOW DOES THE PROGRAM WORK?

(2/3)

- The number of places in the program is limited.
- Instrumental music tuition is based on group lessons.
- There are social benefits from learning with others.
- Instruments are introduced at different year levels.





HOW DOES THE PROGRAM WORK?

(3/3)

- Students must commit to a single teacher for their instrument – either Department or private, but not both.
- Students already learning another instrument must consider how they will balance the demands of learning two instruments.
- Students with many other interests should consider how well they can manage their time.





ENSEMBLE OPPORTUNITIES

- School ensemble experiences may include:
 - concert band
 - orchestra
 - classical guitar ensemble
 - vocal ensemble
 - jazz, contemporary and chamber ensembles
- Some primary schools have:
 - string ensembles
 - junior concert bands
- Most teachers encourage:
 - duets and trios in the class
 - incorporating instruments into class music activities and performances





PERFORMANCE OPPORTUNITIES

Instrumental Music School Services promotes performance opportunities which include:

- OPUS annual IMSS showcase concert at Perth Concert Hall
- Chamber and ensemble festivals
- Workshops
- Master-classes and recitals
- School assemblies





(1/4)

- Tuition is funded by the Department of Education.
- A student journal is provided free of charge each year.
- Guitars, violins, violas and basic percussion equipment are to be self-provided.
- Other instruments may be self-provided (recommended) or loaned through the Department's instrument loan service for the first year (cello: 2 years, double bass: ongoing).





(2/4)

- Certain instruments are loaned to schools at a fee.
- A loan agreement must be signed with the school.
- Private insurance cover is recommended.
- Tutor book, other music, accessories and music stand are to be purchased as required.





(3/4)

Student instrument purchase prices and related information is available from your local retailer:

- Read our *Instrument Purchasing Guides* for general information (includes renting and buying secondhand).
- Always consult your child's instrumental teacher prior to purchase.

(4/4)

There is an investment in time and effort:

- Commitment from student regular practice, lessons, ensembles and performances.
- Commitment from parents/carers support and encouragement, liaison with teacher, becoming 'the taxi', attend performances.

Lessons are scheduled by the IMSS teacher and are usually at a fixed time in primary school, and a rotating timetable in secondary school.





FACTORS THAT INFLUENCE SUCCESS

(1/3)

- Support and encourage your child through the highs and the lows.
- Make music a high priority every lesson counts.
- Promote purposeful practice on the evening after the lesson, and regularly.
- Promote listening to live music and recorded instrumental music as an activity.





FACTORS THAT INFLUENCE SUCCESS

(2/3)

- Provide performance opportunities to "show and tell" your child's musical achievements.
- Use the student journal.
- Communicate with the instrumental teacher it is a partnership!






CONNECT CLASSES – ON-LINE
