

Who are we?

We're called Investigators. We're not teachers or police officers. We visit schools and talk to people. Our job is to make sure that anyone who works at a school is doing the right thing. We're good at listening and we take what people say seriously.

Why are we speaking to you?

If we think that someone who works at a school has done the wrong thing we need to find out what happened. We think you may be able to help us with that. We want to find out what you might have seen or heard. Talking to people helps us decide what to do. Please don't worry – you're not in trouble.

What happens when we speak to you?

Two investigators will come to your school to talk to you. You can have an adult you know with you if it makes you feel better. We will talk to you in a quiet place and record what we all say. It's hard to say how long it will take but you can have a break. When we're finished talking, you'll go back to class. You don't need to bring anything to our talk and you can draw things to help tell us what happened. You don't have to talk to us but it helps a lot if you do. We will have to share some things that you tell us, but we will only tell people who have to know.

What happens after we talk to you?

We might have to talk to other people about what happened. We have to check to see whether the person we spoke about broke any rules. If they have broken the rules then we decide what to do about it. If it is something that happened to you, we will tell your parents or carers when we have finished.
