Reading response journal



Welcome to your reading response journal. This is a journal where you will record your responses to the text studied in this unit. You will do this by answering specific questions and also by choosing response options that appeal to you.

People respond to texts in different ways. There is no right or wrong way. For example, one person

may read a novel and feel moved by an event; however, another may find it boring, and yet another may find it triggers memories of something that has happened in their lives. Your response to a text is entirely personal. Focused response questions will enable you to think about the novel in ways you may not have considered before.

Each chapter will have specific questions that will need to be answered in your journal. Before reading the nominated chapters, take time to look over the specific questions for those chapters as this will allow you to think about your answers while you are reading.

After reading the nominated chapters in the novel you will complete the relevant entries in your reading response journal. You will then choose a number of response options, as directed from the list at the beginning of the journal, and answer them. Make sure you record the date, the chapter number or title as well as your response for each entry.

You will also find space in the journal to record any questions, ideas or words you don't understand. Record these words and look them up in your dictionary. You may also like to speak to an adult about them, and add them to your spelling list.



When responding to questions about a story or a novel it is helpful to structure your answers in a certain way. A good idea is to:

- state your point or idea (eg 1 feel that ..., 1 think ..., this section...)
- gíve an example (words that show this ..., evidence is ...)
- explain (this shows that ..., I think this means ...).



Here is an example.

I really like the way the author began the story with a funny sentence:

'It all began the day my fish swallowed my homework.'

This sentence made me laugh, as I could picture the scene in my head. It also made me want to read on and find out what else would happen.

Some questions will require you to write a paragraph. A paragraph is usually four to five sentences long. It begins with a topic sentence followed by supporting sentences and is finished with a concluding sentence.

For example:



The sea turtle is a large turtle that lives in the ocean. Scientists have been working to gather information about these turtles. Each night the scientists count the turtles as they come ashore. As the turtles lay their eggs, the eggs are counted and recorded. Later, the scientists will record the number of eggs that hatch. The information these scientists are collecting is very important, as these turtles are an endangered species.





It can help you to write a paragraph if you think of the paragraph as a sandwich.

Topic sentence

(introduce the paragraph)

Filling

(share your facts/information in supporting sentences)

Concluding sentence

(close your paragraph)

Remember, when writing responses in your journal there are no wrong answers. Try and make connections between your own experiences, real life and the story. Try to think and react with your feelings. The questions may help you consider topics you wouldn't have thought of writing about before. To help you get started with your responses you may like to use the sample sentence starters.

Take a moment to look over the list of response options and sentence starters. Then refer to the module *Blueback* to find out which chapters to read.



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



Write a diary entry from Abel's point of view after he saw the shark dying and was unable to do anything about it.








